Bonfire Spectacular

The Chacewater community came out in large numbers on November 5th, to enjoy our Bonfire and Fireworks spectacular display on the Millennium Green. Congratulations to all who came along and helped to create such a great atmosphere on the night.

As in previous years ensuring all is safe and legal, Paul Bearham, helped by Shaun Buckingham, organised and fired off an impressive array of fireworks. This was admired by a big crowd on the Green and by many residents unable to leave their homes across the valley.

For the first time this year the bonfire was fuelled by 250 old wooden pallets kindly stored and supplied by Kevin Dabb from **Westfield Transport's** yard on Kerley Hill. Many thanks to Kevin and Westfield's for helping the village while keeping their national and international lorry fleet loaded.

Again, a vital link in our local logistics chain was generously donated by **Dave Bedford** of **Penstraze Sawmills** who sent his tipper truck and driver Mark to pick up and deliver 5 full loads from Kerley Hill to the Millennium Green. Here, a 10-strong team of residents answered the call to help build the bonfire. Linked by Parish Councillor Alan Crocker and his veteran Ferguson tractor (and regardless of several showers of rain), two Malcolms, Steve, Peter and John, Barrie, Rob, Séan, Terry and Paul built a substantial bonfire at the centre of the Green in about 3 hours.

Teamwork led the way. A team from **Chacewater Methodist Church**, led by pastor Adrian Mitchell, served hot drinks all night. Jenny Prime organised a well-drilled team from **Chacewater Bowling Club** who took care of gate security and collected entrance money. The BBQ team, led by Linda Shevlin, began cooking at 5.30pm and worked non-stop for the next 2½ hours to serve up hundreds of burgers, hot-dogs, sausages and chips. Gary (on sweets), Graham, Martin, Angie and Adèle kept the queues moving with a smile; while Steve, John, Peter and Malcolm sweated to cook the food with good humour.

The role of **Chacewater Parish Council** and of individual councillors has been outstanding and indispensable to making this event work for the

benefit of all. The Parish Council provides essential permissions, legal compliance and insurance to guarantee public safety.

8 Parish Councillors, led by P.C. Chair Steve “Burger King” Leech and Vice Chair Peter “Mr Chips” Chesworth, worked throughout the day to make it a success. Cllrs Angie Beckham, John Carley and Rob Knill assisted BBQ & Clear-up teams. We are grateful also to Cllr. Brenda Bailey who does countless tasks behind the scenes and looks after projects finances with the help of Terie Chesworth.

Clear-up teams did a fantastic job. The site was cleared by 9.00pm. Special thanks to Jean and Malcolm who provided a late night fire-watch and cleared the Green of debris in the morning.

Chacewater Village Hall facilities were made available as a service to the community. As usual, Village Hall workers Sian and Mandy had everything prepared and were delighted that everyone’s efficient clear-up allowed them to get home by 10pm. First Aid cover was provided by a **St John’s Ambulance** crew.

As well as providing memorable entertainment, our event raised funds which will be used to finance future community benefits – children’s Xmas party, village festivities, etc. Once again, on behalf of the Chacewater Projects, THANK YOU to all who attended and special thanks to those who gave their time and talents to make the event a success.

Any assistance is always welcome. Next year we’ll light the bonfire at 6.30pm and use more fire-lighters.

First World War casualties continued long after the armistice of 11th November 1918.

IN MEMORIAM

Pte. Thomas Melville **COAD**. 7th (Queen's Own) Hussars.
Died **04 Dec. 1918**

Pte. Thomas Melville Coad died in Baghdad of wounds received 5 weeks earlier during battle at Al Shirqat near Mosul. This was the final engagement with the Turkish Ottoman army in Mesopotamia (on 29th October). An armistice was signed the next day and Mosul city was occupied on 1st November 1918.

Young Thomas was born in 1893 and grew up at Willow House in Penstrase where his father, John Coad was a farmer & pig dealer. Thomas was very much the baby of the family; two sisters and a brother were 6, 7 and 9 years older. His mother, Maria, was 46 years old when Thomas was born. She died in 1909, aged 61. In the same year his sister Belita turned 21 and got married.

In the Spring of 1910, when Thomas was 16, his widowed father re-married and moved into Melbourne House with his new bride Mabel Simmons (34). Thomas stayed on the farm with his elder brother and sister Lily until he joined the army shortly before the outbreak of war.

Pte. Coad H/27864 enlisted with the 7th Queen's Own Hussars, a Household Cavalry regiment with a dashing reputation, known as the "Saucy Seventh". They were posted to India in 1914 and spent three years in Bangalore. In November 1917, as part of the 11th Cavalry Brigade, the unit shipped from Karachi to Basra.

Moving up the river Tigris, in March 1918 Thomas Coad's unit fought at Khan Baghdadi and occupied the city of Baghdad. They were ordered to move north towards Mosul on 23rd October 1918. Making rapid progress, the 7th Hussars were placed to confront the Turks at Al Shirqat where they came under shellfire on the night of 29th October and suffered scores of casualties.

Thomas Melville Coad was sent back downriver to hospital in Baghdad where he died of his wounds. He is buried alongside another 4½ thousand soldiers of the Commonwealth in the Baghdad (North Gate) War Cemetery in Iraq.

IN MEMORIAM

Pte. Seymour **BLEWETT**. Machine Gun Corps (51st Btn).
Died **02 Dec. 1918**

Seymour was the youngest son of Elizabeth Goldsworthy Blewett. His elder sister Edith and brother Richard were born in Camborne before the family moved to Callington; where his father Richard Dunn Blewett worked as a tailor. Seymour (born 1884), another brother William and younger sister Elizabeth May also were born and schooled in Callington.

At the turn of the century, the industrious family came to Truro and lived in Edward Street where they were tailors, ran a sewing machine agency and a printshop. Seymour was about 20 years old when his mother died. His widowed father re-married in 1906 and Seymour stayed in the family home for the next 10 years to live and work alongside his father and stepmother Harriet.

33 year old Seymour Blewett enlisted with the army on 10th December 1915 and was put in the Army Reserve. In May 1916 he was mobilised and posted to the 3rd/4th Btn. Royal Berkshire Regt. Before he left for military training, Seymour married 39 year old widow Jessie Dowrick (née Pascoe) who lived at Rose Cottage, Greenbottom.

Pte. Blewett arrived in France and joined his unit in September 1916. Two months later he was transferred to the 145th Machine Gun Company in Ypres and given a new regimental number 70654. Suffering the privations of winter in Flanders, Seymour was hospitalised in January and February of 1917 and was posted in March to the 164th MGC with the North Lancashire Brigade, 55th Division. He spent 4 months with this unit in the field at Ypres.

Early in July 1917 Pte. Seymour Blewett was admitted to the Field Ambulance for two weeks and his legs treated for "Inflamed Connective Tissue". Returned to his unit, he was transferred on 26th July to the 165th MGC with the Liverpool Brigade in the Division. Days later they were thrown into the desperate battle for Pilkem Ridge where more than 3½ thousand men were lost in the week up to 4th August. The 55th Division

was withdrawn on 7th August to be re-built, together with the 51st Highland Division which had fought alongside them.

Pte. Blewett was admitted to the 3rd Canadian Casualty Clearing Station and then posted to the 152nd Machine Gun Company of the 1st Highland Brigade. A Medical Board on 28th August classified him with T.B. and a defective heart. It's unlikely that Seymour joined the Highlanders in the costly attack on the Menin Road Ridge. However, when the 51st Division was withdrawn, he was posted to the 153rd MGC on 27th September to make up numbers in the 2nd Highland Brigade.

Pte. Blewett had been in France for more than a year when he joined his new unit in October 1917. His new CO promptly granted Seymour home leave so he could return to the U.K. for a couple of weeks. Back from leave, he had to hunker down near Cambrai and survive the winter months with the Gordon Highlanders – a cold duty standing by a machine gun.

In February 1918, British army re-organisation created the Machine Gun Corps and Seymour Blewett's company merged into the 51st Battalion MGC. Still with the 51st Division, they were at the heart of a strong defensive line near Flesquieres. When the German army made a massive attack on 21st March 1918 they swept round the sides of this line and poured gas into the salient.

The 51st Division was ordered to make a fighting retreat, which was achieved with the loss of nearly 5 thousand men. Pte. Blewett 70654 was among those reported missing in action. In fact, he was taken as a Prisoner of War and was sent to POW camp at Heilsberg – far away in East Prussia (now in Poland, some 130Km. east of Gdansk).

German authorities reported that Pte. S. Blewett died on 2nd December 1918 - of inflammation of the Lungs and heart failure. He was buried in the camp cemetery together with 38 other casualties. Re-named after the WW2, it is now the LIDZBARK WARMINSKI WAR CEMETERY, maintained by the CWGC near the Polish town of Lidzbark Warminski.

Seymour's widow Jessie and her child received a weekly pension of 20s.5d – starting from October 1919.

CHACEWATER'S WEEK OF REMEMBRANCE

100 years after the very first Armistice Day events were introduced by King George V, Chacewater certainly did its bit to commemorate the occasion leading up to and including the Service of Remembrance on Sunday the 10th November.

As described in previous articles for What's On, a fantastic group of ladies from within and outside the Parish committed huge amounts of time crocheting or knitting over 1500 poppies throughout the past 12 months.

Deployed as either standalone exhibits or part of a much larger attraction, most of our commercial outlets, beautifying flower boxes, the Church Lych Gate and "Welcome" tin trollies provided perfect backdrops for carefully crafted hessian drops, which looked simply fabulous. The main railing outside the Primary School was adorned with a number of supersized poppies, as were the pews and communion rail in St Paul's Church. The Church also played host to a wonderful drape and another was seen outside the Bowling Club- super efforts both!



The two most dramatic displays this year were reserved for:

- The Millennium Green, which saw the pathway clearly identified by 800 plastic poppies (recycled from the bottom of bottles donated by the community) planted by pupils from our lovely primary school.
- The Church spire, where the bulk of the 1500 poppies had been attached to a huge fishing net salvaged by the "Ghostbusters" beach cleaning team at Perranporth.

Magnificent works of art (no photograph will ever do them justice), all of our features received most positive recognition from across the community this year. So, thank you once again to everyone involved – more next year we hope!

A huge thanks must also go to Linda Shevlin who gave a quite excellent talk about life - from a medical perspective - in the trenches of the First World War, up at the Church on the Friday evening. This certainly set the tone for reflection, especially given the superbly created accompanying graphic display board, which included accounts of many of the fallen men of Chacewater that has been so well researched by husband Paul.

In part, and hopefully due to a combination of all the above, the Service of Remembrance was itself very well attended this year. 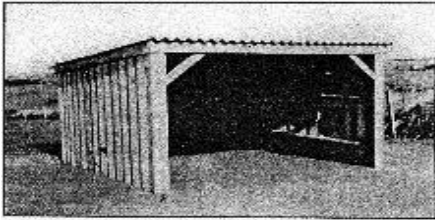
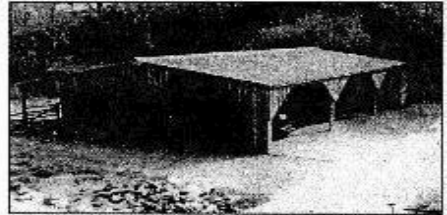

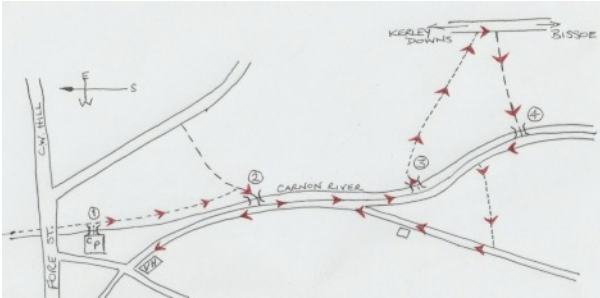

Chacewater Rights of Way Wak

Sunday 3rd November 2019: There was some blue sky as 7 walkers and 1 dog (missing some regular CROW walkers but all dressed for wet weather) agreed on a route taking us up and down both sides of the Carnon River valley.



Leaving the Car Park by the footbridge across the river①, we turned Right and headed South on the footpath behind the waterworks. [N.B. This narrow path, with 2 stiles and large slippery tree roots across it, not suitable for

pushchairs.]

Meeting the Bridleway from Kerley Farm we turn downhill and cross the river again② by the driveway to Goosehecca Farm where we join the valley road and turn Left towards Twelveheads. Follow the road for about 1Km – keep left at the fork. Where the road dips we turn Left and negotiate a small flood to cross the river③ and follow the path diagonally up the eastern side of the valley. Where the hedges open we can see fields and farmsteads laid out in a wide vista below.

Arriving at the ridge road between Kerley Downs and Bissoe, we pause for traffic to pass while a short, sharp, shower tests our waterproofs. Turn South along the road for 100m. then Right down the Bridlepath which drops steeply straight down the valley side (pass two slurry tanks in the field).

Recent repair works have effectively stabilised the path surface and two cross beams/drains have stopped run-off water creating wash-out gullies. Crossing the river once again on a wooden footbridge④, turn Right onto Twelveheads road and walk past Willow Bridge Cottage.

About 200m along the road we opted to turn Left – a short scramble up the bank and the footpath leads uphill to the Rising Sun farm road.

Paused for a group photo by the field entrance and then a gentle ramble downhill towards Chacewater, returning to the Car Park just after 11 am.

Local Government News.

Dear Reader

Rain, rain and more rain seemed to be the main weather we had through October - and November has not started any better. We have had trouble in several areas and one of the more significant was Church Hill and in particular the drains outside the Village Hall and just past the road entrance to Twelveheads. I have asked our Highway Surveyor to check all the drains running down Church Hill and to make sure that all the "sumps" are cleaned out. We have also had flooding along the Kea Downs Road which has also been attended to, a big thank you to everyone who helped so far trying to clear the pipe work between manholes.

Whilst we have had even more rain since I started to write this article, at least we had a dry Bonfire evening which was another very successful event and I am confident when all the expenses are accounted for the finances will prove to be in good order. Again, huge thanks to everyone involved and for all the organisations pulling together to make it happen.

Cornwall Council has been involved in a consultation process which has been almost a road show, taking an exhibition around many villages in this part P.T.O.

of Cornwall showing their thoughts and ideas regarding the “Langarth Development”. This included their latest suggestion about creating a Garden Village to be incorporated as a way of making the whole area more attractive. This village will be situated on a north facing slope and as farmers and gardeners know, is not conducive to good plant cultivation and am afraid that it gives me negative feelings.

I also have grave misgivings about the already proposed Northern area relief road which they now plan to restrict to 20mph. This, as I see it, will not give much relief to the overflowing A390 road as it is today let alone all the extra people who the Council hope will be living at Langarth. Whilst many of the proposed residents will walk or cycle short distances in dry weather condition I feel that with the conditions that we have been experiencing recently with lots of rain and gales these people will resort to their cars and numbers of people using such a facility will fall off quite significantly and there will be further car use— or am I being too negative? I am also very concerned about the impact of increased traffic on the B3284 into Shortlanesend as the motorists will always try to avoid long queues and will go for alternative routes into Truro.

The real reason that the Langarth development has not moved, is a slowing down of the Housing Market and perhaps even more importantly the cost of the infrastructure required. I know that Central Government has given grants and made offers of loans, but Governments and Councils have no money of their own, it all has to come from a) the tax payer and b) the rate payer – in other words that is you and me!!

I hope if anybody attends, or has attended, any of the Cornwall Council Road Shows, you will write your concerns about the A390 road from Chiverton to Truro as the road, in my opinion, does not cope with the traffic as it is today and the impact it is having on the B3284 through Shortlanesend.

You can also send any other comments, concerns, or thoughts about opportunities into Cornwall Council addressed for the attention of The Langarth Programme Team c/o Alice Brown via langarthgv@cornwall.gov.uk.

I am pleased to say that I have had further contact with Tregothnan Estate about “The Shute” however according to their Land Agent the detailed plans about it and any feeder pipes are somewhat sketchy. Perhaps at this point I could appeal to everyone who lives on the Kerley side of the Shute to look around their properties and tell me if they have any areas of excessive damp/water as all the water that should be coming out of “the Shute” must be going somewhere and we need your help to resolve this issue.

Congratulations and thanks to everyone involved in reminding us to remember all those that have lost their life for our freedom. The Poppies displayed throughout the village including the Church, School and Bowling Club –were wonderful and thank you to all the knitters and crocheters!!.

It is always seemingly is strange to me, that as we pause for Remembrance Sunday, I need to end this article by wishing everyone a very happy Christmas and in anticipation thank everyone involved in making the celebrations in the village bright and cheerful.

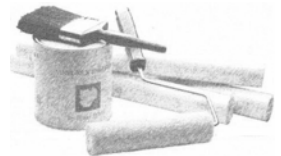

The Robin...Britain's Favourite Bird

Robins are one of the commonest birds in Britain. They are a bird of woodland and glades, a habitat almost perfectly replicated by millions of gardens, of all shapes and sizes, the length and breadth of the country. It follows then that we are very familiar with them. On the continent however the relationship between man and robin is very different and British birdwatchers on foreign trips are surprised by how hard they are to find, confined normally to woods and hedgerows.

Here of course they adorn countless Christmas cards every year. Why robins? Well, the answer is in the colour of every Royal Mail van. Red. In Victorian times the uniform of postal workers was red and they had the nick-name 'robins'. They of course delivered Christmas cards and a few clever artists started putting a real robin on a card, some even carrying an envelope in its beak. This association with Christmas was clearly popular and it has stuck to the present day. Strangely a card usually depicts a robin in a setting of thick snow, which for the robin would be decidedly harsh but cute to look at for us!

It was always thought for decades that robins belonged to the thrush family. Modern DNA analysis has proven this wrong though and now they are placed in the family of Old World Flycatchers. From a birdwatchers point of view this is much posher as most of us would far sooner see a type of flycatcher than a thrush!

Weirdly though, the name robin red-breast persists but the breast isn't red at all, (except on the worst Christmas cards) it's orange. It's that colour for a reason too. Not for wooing a female, as she has the same colour breast, but for threatening others. Robins are highly territorial and will defend a breeding territory from around February and in winter defend a much smaller one on its own.

They sing different songs in spring, summer and winter. The winter one is particularly weak and almost mournful and as soon as it is heard you know the season is changing. They also sing at night in areas with street lights. This gives rise to the many erroneous claims of hearing a nightingale, just because it is dark. This singing is a way to mark their territorial boundaries. Woe betide a rival robin to enter as any illusion that they are a



‘bird of peace’, such as on the Christmas card, is quickly dispelled in the mayhem of fighting that will ensue. In winter a rival doesn’t just mean another male. Females are unwanted too, as the winter territory is defended as a food resource for that single bird and no other.

Come spring of course and the mechanics of mating require there to be another bird of the opposite sex around and this is the only time when that happens. The sites chosen by robins for their nest are

many. A shelf in a garden shed, inside a pile of old tyres, inside a greenhouse that has a broken pane of glass or a hole in a stone wall, even wood piles. Anywhere that offers a dry, safe nest. Tragically many in suburban areas fall prey to cats and magpies can be seen actively searching bushes in a garden, looking for unguarded robin and blackbird nests.

Young robins just out of the nest have no orange on them. If they did they would be driven away. They are small dumpy little birds with a heavily speckled chest. Robins have a clever way of limiting losses of babies at this most vulnerable stage. They spread them out, one under this bush, another over there, another behind that bush and so on. In this way if a predator finds and takes one, it hasn't found them all. People though, find a baby robin seemingly 'abandoned'. It isn't, it's been hidden on its own for a reason and needs to be left where it is. Mum and Dad know exactly where and will bring food to it and all the others until they are independent.

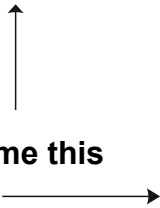

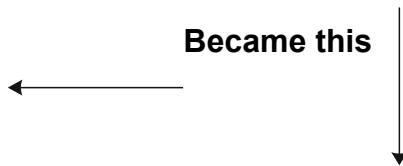
