Chacewater Rights of Way Walking Group

Sunday 6th October 2019

11 Walkers, one dog and Paul Shevlin's youngest grandchild, travelling in style, left Chacewater Car park on a bright and breezy day, shortly after 9.30am Sunday 6th October, bound for Unity Woods, to see how things are progressing since the recent woodland management work.

Our route took us up Church Hill, until we reached the footpath on the right, where we left the road heading towards Cox Hill. Despite the recent heavy rain, the pathways were in good condition and a real pleasure to walk. At Truro Tractors we took the footpath that leads down the hill to the bottom corner of Unity Woods, briefly joining the Devoran -Portreath Trail. Our route took us up the hill through the woods heading towards Killifreth Mine. It was interesting to see how quickly the woods are recovering from the recent felling and clearing and there is considerable evidence of new growth. It has been reported that there is an increase in

the diversity of wildlife in the area since the work. All the footpaths through the wood were in good condition, clear and easy to navigate. On reaching Killifreth Mine, which I understand has the tallest chimney in the county, the group stopped for the usual group photograph



From Killifreth we took the pathway to join the B3298, where we turned right in the direction of Chacewater, continuing up to the crossroads, where we again turned right and stopped to have a look at the restoration work taking place at Killifreth Stamps, which will be a house when all the work is finished.



We carried on down the road until we reached the footpath to Salem, then took the right fork back to Truro Tractors. Carrying on down the road for about 250 yards, we then took the footpath on the right which took us past the old quarry to re-join Church Hill, which is where we turned left down the hill to return to our starting point - the car park.

The walk took just over 2 hours, but was taken at a leisurely pace and was about 3.5 miles. The weather held fair, which made for a very pleasant way to spend a Sunday morning.

The next walk will be on Sunday 3rd November.



Chacewater Team Visit To The St Dennis Cornwall Energy Recovery Centre (Cerc) 15th October 2019

So, you want to find out what happens with all the household rubbish generated across Cornwall? Well, pay a visit to the Cornwall Energy Recovery Centre (CERC as it is known!) at St Dennis, just like a delegation from Chacewater Parish did on Tuesday the 15th October.



Hugely interesting, our host Emma Emmens (the CERC Education & Community Officer) gave a group of 9 from Chacewater a detailed opening brief on the site and its history, before kitting us out with all the appropriate safety equipment ahead of taking us around the hole plant for a visit that lasted a good 2 hours.



The huge Grab claws in the Waste Bunker break down much of the bulk waste before it is transferred into the Waste Hopper.



It then goes through a series of processes before being burnt and generating enough electricity back to the National Grid to power 20 thousand homes!

The explanation of the “cradle to grave” process of waste disposal and subsequent energy creation was truly fascinating.



For some reason people always want to look at what is left over? In this regard, we were no exception - the Chacewater group view the metallic deposits bin at the end of the line.

So, with a few myths exploded along the way in terms of how we are dealing with our household waste in Cornwall - much of which had been negatively reported through the media - the Chacewater group who visited CERC on the 15th October left the site much better informed and most positive about how this vital area of Energy Regeneration was being managed.

This Year's Period Of Remembrance Current And Future Planning



Preparations for this year's period of Remembrance are moving on apace, on three specific fronts. Firstly, a couple of kind volunteers have been up at the War Memorial and given it a good clean up, which has made a real difference – more about our plans in this area later!

Second, a team of fabulous ladies from across the wider Chacewater community have produced well over **a thousand knitted or crocheted poppies** throughout the last year, which will

be sited in or on various buildings and structures throughout the village in the weeks leading to and immediately after the week of Remembrance. We held a **“Poppy Workshop”** in the Old Market on 14th October, which afforded the opportunity to prepare various display pieces and plan deployment options in order to achieve best effect.

A number of small teams will be out and about throughout the week preceding the 10th November, attaching poppies of all shapes and sizes to installations such as: our “Welcome to Our Village” trollies, the Beautifying Chacewater flower tubs, school railings, shops, etc. We have also sourced a large washed up **fishing net** (*from Ghostbusters ALDFG Recovery team at Perranporth*) which will have loads of poppies attached, which will provide a nice backdrop on the steeple wall of St Paul’s. Other displays will also be tailored for use inside the church itself.

It will clearly take a bit of time to achieve all we want to here and of course everything needs to be taken down throughout the week after Remembrance so they are stored for future years. As previously scripted, in parallel with the crocheted and knitted poppies, we have also produced close on **800 “plastic poppies”**. Made from the base of various size and shaped plastic bottles, this is true recycling in action and they can be used in the years ahead. To be placed in two specific locations, members of our Community Primary School will plant as many as they can on either side of the pathway from bottom to the top of the Millennium Green on

Thursday the 7th November. A few volunteers will also display an arc of plastic poppies behind the St Paul’s War Memorial itself.

We had planned to introduce some form of thoughtful silhouetted light/laser display on the side of the church steeple this year but time and planning has meant this will be a target for 2020 instead.

Finally, we have plans to more formally recognise those from our community who made the ultimate sacrifice

during any conflicts following the First World War, perhaps with a plinth near to the existing War Memorial - which cannot be amended due to its Listed status. We are therefore hoping to that family of friends of the Chacewater community may help with the research required to enable this to happen throughout the coming year. There seems to be a yawning gap in our collective knowledge here, which we feel ought to be filled. IN MEMORIAM

Pte. Joseph Albert MOORE. Machine Gun Corps, 47th Btn.
Died 6 November 1918

Born in Chacewater in 1898, Joseph Albert Moore was the youngest of five surviving children. He was sixteen years old at the start of the war, living in Chacewater with his mother Jane and two older brothers William and Phillip. Sisters Mary and Adelaide had left home some years before.

Pte. Moore initially joined up with the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry [29347. He trained as a machine gunner and was transferred into the 47th Btn. the Machine Gun Corps (MGC), when it was formed on 1st Mar 1918. [159319]. This unit remained fully engaged on the Western Europe Front until the end of the war. In the last weeks of March and early April, they faced the onslaught of the German Spring Offensive in battles at St Quentin, Bapaume and the Ancre. Some months later, Moore and his comrades fought over the same ground as the German armies were pushed back in the battles of Albert and (2nd) Bapaume during August and early September 1918.

Allied advances continued into the Artois region, taking important centres of Lens and Douai. On 2nd November, gun crews of the 47th Btn. MGC were hit by shellfire. Joseph Albert was seriously wounded and died of his wounds 4 days later on 6th November 1918, only 5 days before the shooting stopped. Pte. Albert Moore is buried south of Roubaix town in the small Willems Community Cemetery, very close to the Belgian border. He lies next to the grave of his Sergeant, Arthur Dennes, (also of the 47th Btn. MGC), who was killed outright on the day Albert was fatally wounded.

Cornwall Community Celebrations 2019 - Chacewater Volunteers Recognised

Thursday the 10th October saw several members from Chacewater Parish join many other like-minded people from across the county at the Eden Project for the annual Cornwall Community Celebration evening, to recognise significant voluntary work across their communities. A sort of awards event for which certificates were presented according to specified categories, volunteers from Chacewater were recognised in the: Transforming Spaces, Team Effort and Transforming Lives categories. Specifically, this related to works in relation to the Twelveheads Pocket Parks Plus Project and Chacewater Parish Renewable Energy Group. A shortened transcript covering each project was read out on the evening, as follows:

“A group of dedicated volunteers applied for (and received) funding through the Government’s Pocket Parks Plus initiative to refurbish the Twelveheads Village Play Park. The whole project took around 6 months to complete and became a real self-help “labour of love”, which was all the more worthwhile because it clearly meant so much to the Twelveheads community who also supported the Team all the way through to project completion.

A second initiative chimed directly with Cornwall Council’s declaration of a climate change emergency and saw (on the 27th July) the Chacewater Community Energy Group host a most successful renewable energy and electric vehicle day. Attended by well over 450 people – including many Cornwall Councillors and a number of internationally renowned speakers – the team of volunteers who delivered the event again dedicated nearly 6 months to a task that has very much set the bar for other events of a similar type to follow.

Both of these projects were delivered by the same volunteer group who have shown a real commitment and collective team

effort, which has contributed a great deal to transforming both spaces and lives across their community and the wider region.”

Recognition was also given to one of our very own “Unsung Heroes”, Mr Paul Shevlin, who was duly recognised for his oft unseen voluntary work in and around Chacewater. Richly deserved, the citation for Paul covered:

- His continued work in support of the Beautifying Chacewater project, our all-year round floral basket display throughout the main village.
- His design and build of the mock tin mine trolleys at either end of the village.
- The endless work Paul puts in to manage the Millennium Green, which offers a balance of neatness and Environmental Growth for residents and visitors to enjoy.
- His contribution to the maintenance of the Leat water course, which helps prevent potential downstream floodwaters from reaching the village.
- Much of the design and work involved in delivering the refurbishment of Twelveheads Play Park.
- The monthly What’s On “Pond Watch” articles, which appraises the community of wildlife activity in and around that particular space.
- His well-researched historic articles about key buildings, locations or individuals from across the parish, which attract positive attention, both locally and from afar.
- The research and diagrammatical detail he put into the Chacewater Parish Neighbourhood Development Plan, Parish Design Statement and Local Landscape Character Assessment.
- Paul’s secretarial work in support of both Chacewater Projects and the Community Energy Group – both leading lights in terms of community initiatives.
- His help to deliver the annual Chacewater Bonfire evening and Carol Services.

In sum, Paul is always there when something needs doing. That reliable, trustworthy individual who does all he can to make our community a better place in which to live, who accepts little in return.

So, another good year of volunteering, we look forward as a Parish to delivering many more meaningful projects in the years ahead and recognising those who can commit to help deliver them – we have so many ideas!!

Dear Reader

Following last month's report about the Shute I am still awaiting a reply from Mr Simon Leather who has kindly promised he would investigate the Tregothnan Estate archives to see if they have any records in their paperwork that show what pipes might be supplying the tank at the rear of the actual Shute. My thanks to all, including Chacewater Parish Council Members, for their help with this ongoing scene.

Topical at the moment, and last evening as I write, is the Parish Boundary Review which is taking place across the whole of Cornwall Council. They have set up a committee to review the situation and last evening Chacewater was on the agenda, looking mainly at the boundary with St Agnes Parish. The other neighbouring Parishes, that is Kea, Kenwyn, Gwennap and Redruth have all suggested a "no change" situation that has been accepted. Much discussion took place with Chacewater and the St Agnes Parishes putting their case to the five members of the P.T.O.

Boundary Committee this was then followed by a question answer opportunity and I was also invited to have an input into the discussions. I was able to express my worries that any development in Blackwater could cause flooding at Chacewater because all the roofs, paths, driveways etc. from any new development will be sending extra water down through Jolly's Bottom into Riverside before going under the main road on its way to Devoran via Twelveheads and Bissoe.

The Chacewater Referendum has of course taken place – the final opportunity for all residents to give their opinion on the long-term planning needs for the Parish. We do appreciate all the effort put in by Mr Rob Knill and his team as well as a big thank to every resident who voted. I do hope that there has been a “high turnout”

Finally, it is always good to end this article on an issue that brings pleasure to so many, and that is Chacewater's Bonfire Night - organised by the “Projects” team., this will take place soon after the publication of the edition of “What's On “ and let us hope for kind weather – a dry evening and above all, a safe one.

VILLAGE PONDWATCH OCTOBER 2019

On bright days, a large Southern Hawker dragonfly patrols the sunny side of the pond. His bright green striped body, its black and green spotted tail with a blue tip, glitters in the air. He flies “like a hawk” – hovering over the water, patient and methodical horizontal flight pattern interrupted by sudden swoops at speed. Defying gravity, the dragonfly shoots upwards faster than his feathered namesake stoops from above.

Despite a stiff breeze, a handful of Common red Darter dragonflies spring from their perches to challenge the larger Hawker each time he passes by. They also hover and compete to attract a mate. Sycamore seeds spiral downwards while a coupled pair seeks refuge on a bramble leaf. A wren ducks into plants at the waterside and another small brown bird hunts through the bramble patch.

After a prolonged period of wet weather the pond is full of water. Weed is sinking, lily pads are turning yellow and brown as they decay and patches of clear water are extending. A ramshorn snail drifts at the surface, raises its foot and sails slowly above the sinking vegetation. After a short journey the snail takes its foot out of the wind, rolls over and settles to graze on a submerged lily leaf.

Everything seems to be slowing down. There are fewer insects, wasps move more lazily and the water boatmen make smaller ripples when they paddle on the surface. However, when the rain stops, several butterflies pass by.

In all respects our NDP referendum result topped every other Parish or Town in Cornwall. Perhaps we could have done a bit better but 94.8% of those who voted actually supported our Plan, which was terrific and meant that many people across the community had been engaged in the process.

But what does all this mean? Well, our Plan now carries full weight when planning decisions are made and Cornwall Council’s Development Management team have been made fully aware of this fact and the Referendum result. The next step is for the Local Planning Authority (LPA) to produce a report to the Plan can be formally adopted. This has gone for sign off and will e-mailed to the Parish Clerk, once the decision notice has been published.

In much broader and longer terms, we can also crack on with some of the many potential projects that the NDP process identified for action in the years ahead; and these will hopefully include:

- Car Park and Road Safety enhancements in the Parish core.
- Regenerating the Old Smithy and Observatory up on Wheal Busy.
- Opening up Cornwall Wildlife Site (CWS) wetland site south of the A30 near Blackwater.
- Give our Youth a real focus and facility/area to use.
- Build a new Multi-Sports facility up on the Recreation Ground.
- Improve access to our Public Rights of Way (PRoW), esp. from Chacewater to Blackwater.
- Have a crack at putting Chacewater forward as part of the “Britain in Bloom” initiative.
- Introduce new allotments and an orchard plantation above the school.
- Enhancements to the Millennium Green.
- A futuristic Streetscape research project aimed at addressing the speed and volume of traffic through the core of the village.
- Initiate a real “Heritage Chacewater” programme.
- Maximising the right aspects of Renewable Energy, wherever and whenever we can.

The “Made” Plan will remain on the Chacewater Village website for years to come, so everyone is encouraged to review this most important of documents. It provides a great deal of detail on what we are about as a Parish and what wish to deliver on behalf of those living in this wonderful place.

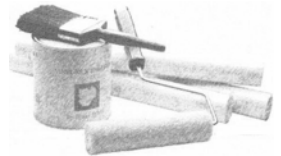

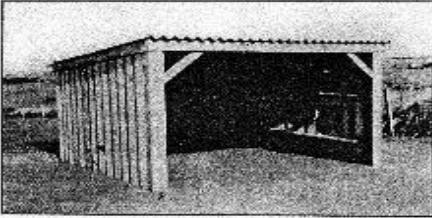

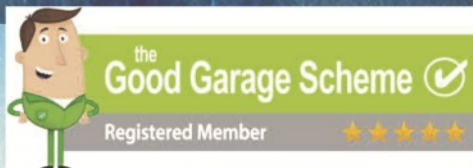
