Groceries, Off-licence, newsagents: Chacewater Store, Fore St.; Old Mill Village Shop & Blackwater Post Office. (both open every day).

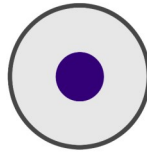

EMERGENCY PLAN

REVIEWED AND EXERCISED

A vital part of any Town or Parish Community Resilience strategy is to have an effective Emergency Plan (EP) and Chacewater has one! The Parish Council has :

- Briefed our EP to the annual Cornwall Community Flood Forum (CCFF) meeting back in October 2024, we made a repeat appearance at the same forum in late 2025.
- Briefed our community in the Village Hall on Saturday 13th December 2025.
- In truth, the pre-Christmas brief wasn't that well attended, but we were able to get together the basis of a Community Response Team (CRT) and review the plethora of documents (from Cornwall Council and other sources) used to inform a good EP.
- Observed, triaged events and taken onboard some of the Lessons from the January 2026 storms and associated winter weather.
- Pulled some of the EP Team together on Saturday morning the 21st March, to do another desk top review of the Plan. Exercised our EP on Saturday morning of the 11th April.



Like all things, we probably learnt more - as a Team - in the 2 hours together on 11th April as we ever would, sat round a table; although we did a bit of that too, as folk needed to be brought up to date with the EP itself!

Some of the lessons/actions taken from the 11th April exercise, that we need to incorporate into the Chacewater Parish EP are:

- We must exercise our EP annually, at very least. Our next exercise will be overseen by members of CCFF and/or CC, which will be good.
- We need another review of the EP now - two CRT volunteers have this in hand.
- We need a good level of CRT Kit & Equipment familiarity. All now stored (in listed boxes) in the cupboard next to the Disabled Toilet, in the Village Hall, we have loads of space here, for additional items, which might include: Foil Blankets, maybe an Emergency Shelter, Handwarmers, etc. over time.

- We need to know what the first steps to take would be in the event of an emergency, i.e. what would be the **trigger** to enact the EP.
- The 11th April saw us communicate beforehand, take note of Warnings Locally or Nationally and then set up our ICP (the HQ) in the Wheal Jane Room at the Village Hall. We will probably use the Killifreth Room in future as it would aid better comms.
- We need to confirm who from the CRT is available and how to best use their skillsets.
- Our CRT is drawn from all parts of the Parish and we will soon have a Chacewater EP/CRT WhatsApp Group.
- We need to follow that old adage that “an Army should not march on an empty stomach”.
- Members of the CRT brought flasks of tea/coffee and essential provisions to the ICP, so the Team could go out on the ground, well sustained.
- We will always need to test (and keep charged!!) our walkie talkies which, despite having little “over the horizon” scope, nevertheless proved very useful.
- We need to make up official CRT Lanyard/ID badge holders (c/w Passport sized photos), as it will increase confidence levels across the resident community.
- We need to find a really effective way of identifying those “Vulnerable” residents, the idea of a double sided **red/green** window cards has been suggested.
- We need to produce a list of Personal Skillsets of folk across the Parish, i.e. Doctors, First Aiders, etc. who might be able to help.

As stated, the above are just some of the Lessons/Actions taken from our exercise morning. The **bottom line** is (and hopefully this offers a good degree of reassurance), **we have** a worked-up **Emergency Plan (EP)** and it has been formally acknowledged. It was great to have so many folk in the same room, all pulling in the same direction on Saturday 11th April 2026.



Thanks to each and every one who has agreed to be part of the Chacewater Parish Emergency Plan team; we hope we don't have to enact it for real but it's there just in case!

Millennium Green

Chacewater Millennium Green offers open air for people and varied habitats for wildlife. The Green occupies the hillside between the Village Hall and St Paul's Churchyard, with a safe pathway from the Hall to the new car park by the School and pedestrian access off Church Hill.

It is home for badgers, foxes, rabbits, voles, field mice, grass snakes and cats. There are hundreds of plant species and thousands of insects and other invertebrates, each with their place beside frogs, toads, newts and many types of bird.

The Green provides a wild adventure playground for youngsters to explore as well as places to meet and chat or quiet corners to rest, enjoy the views and contemplate nature. Now that

spring is here there is work to be done. We try to keep a light touch but sustain varied habitats for wildlife.

There's grass to be mown, brambles controlled, woodland to manage. The footpaths and boules pitch need to be kept safe for public use; park benches repaired and possibly replaced.

Many park users help to remove litter, keeping it tidy and safe for wildlife. We are very grateful for anyone who can spare an hour or so at any time to help tackle some of the bigger jobs. **We have the tools, if you have the time, please contact the Parish Clerk or volunteer co-ordinator on 01872 561626.**

No Mow May

A Crucial Time for Courting Hedgehogs

How leaving your lawn untouched can help hedgehogs thrive this spring .
As No Mow May approaches, many households are preparing to give their mowers a rest—and our hedgehogs couldn't be more grateful. Early spring through June is peak hedgehog courtship season, and a wilder garden can make courtship safer, calmer, and far more successful for these much-loved mammals.

Why No Mow May Matters for Hedgehogs ?

- Hedgehogs rely on long grass, leaf litter, and dense vegetation for:
- Invertebrates to eat
- Safe nesting material
- Hiding places from predators
- Quiet, undisturbed space for mating



Even one month of reduced mowing boosts insect numbers, increases cover, and lowers the risk of disturbing nesting females. It's best to leave hedgehogs undisturbed unless you notice:

- A hedgehog out in the daytime (usually a sign of illness) Visible wounds, bleeding, or limping
- Flies around the body (a medical emergency)
- A hedgehog trapped or unable to escape an obstacle

How to Support Hedgehogs

- Avoid mowing or strimming—especially long grass or under hedges.
- Provide fresh water daily.
- Offer meaty cat food (never milk or bread).
- Create hedgehog highways—small 13cm holes in fences to allow access between gardens.
- Leave natural areas with leaves, logs, and undisturbed corners.

A Kinder Garden Makes a Safer Spring

Cross Lanes Geothermal Lithium Project

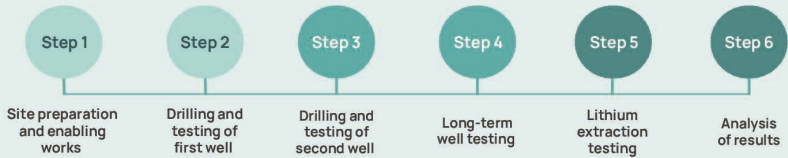
Cornish Lithium is an innovative mineral exploration and development company focused on the responsible extraction of lithium.

Lithium is a key component of lithium-ion batteries, which power consumer electronics, electric vehicles and grid-scale energy storage systems, and it is vital that the UK secures its own supply as global demand grows.

In Cornwall, lithium occurs naturally within geothermal waters that circulate deep underground, where temperatures reach around 80 degrees centigrade.

Following positive results from previous exploration, we are developing our Cross Lanes Geothermal Lithium Project near Chacewater for potential commercial lithium extraction.

TIMELINE Phase 1 2026



Phase 1 of the Project began in January with a programme of enabling works and site preparation, undertaken by local contractor, WH Bond. The drill rig is anticipated to arrive this summer. Two production-scale wells will then be drilled to depths of around 2,000 metres and tested extensively as will our chosen Direct Lithium Extraction technology through a modular demonstration plant. The data generated will enable us to assess the commercial viability of this project.

Engaging with our communities is important to us. Our Cross Lanes Community Liaison Group brings together local residents and organisations, and meets regularly to share information and answer questions.

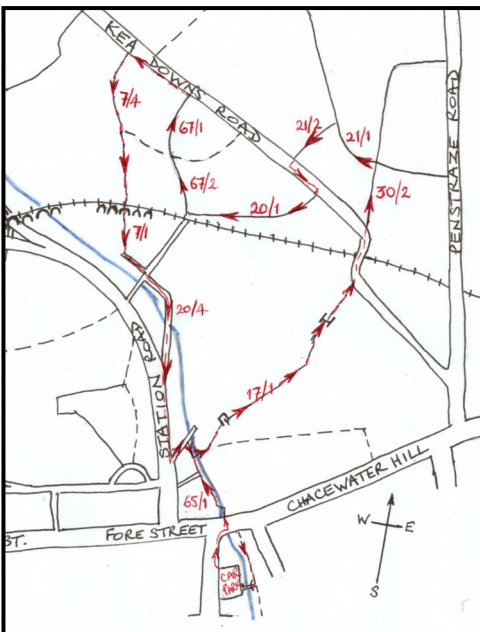

Leaving the Main Square Car Park in slightly inclement weather, a little bit of the wet stuff accompanied us as we crossed Fore Street and onto Footpath 65/ 1, which runs parallel to the Carnon River. The sun started peep out just as we turned right over the wooden bridge and then it really shone as we turned left up and out onto the open and

very green landscape that surrounds Footpath 17/1. This path initially takes you along a well-trodden track on the right before cutting diagonally across a second field towards a pretty challenging historic stone stile, hidden behind a lovely yellow gorse bush. This is where we paused for both our photograph on this walk, the one to the right showing the view of Chacewater village in the background – Spring had arrived!

So, with a little help in some cases, we safely negotiated the stone stile (well over 100 years old we think?), before heading on towards Tamblyns Barn and out onto Kea Downs Road. Eyes now sharp for traffic, we turned left over the “Weak Bridge” before cutting down right along the very well-kept Byway 30/ 2. Soon we connected with Byway 21/ 1 which took us left and then back again towards Kea Downs Road on the muddy and overhanging strands of Byway 21/ 2 – volunteers will be out to give this some attention in due course!

Keen to see the condition of many of the PRoW in this area, we turned left for about 20 yards on Kea Downs in order to link with Byway 20/ 1 (at Woodbury) on the right which, although a bit slippery in places, is otherwise in excellent

condition. If you need to take stock of where you are at this point, then just wait for the next train on the main London to Penzance railway line as it runs parallel just 4 metres to the left.

We emerged from this little venture just above the railway crossing that takes you down to Jolly's Bottom, but we chose instead to go right at this point, on a zigzag tour of equally well-maintained Byways 67/2 and 1. Stopping for the occasional story, we soon came out onto Kea Downs Road for a final time, turning left for about 100 metres as far as Parc Shady Farm and left down Bridleway 7/4. Eventually, this bridleway links with Footpath 7/1 which takes you under the viaduct and down to Bridleway 20/4 near the aforementioned Jolly's Bottom Farm/Barn area.

Now on our way back into the heart of the village, past the old water pump point (just google Chacewater Pathe News to show this in action in 1950) and our lovely pair of sleeping pigs, we were out on Station Road in no time. Saying goodbye to some of our party along the way, Buddy then had an epic time splashing and splashing the length of the now calmed Carnon River, whilst the rest of us used Footpath 65/1 once again, back towards Fore Street.

Rather unusually, we arrived back in the Main Square Car Park just before 1100, which amused some, including the author of this piece. Our **next CRoW walk** departs the **Main Car Park at 0930 on Sunday 3rd May 2026** - do join us if you feel like a good trek and a natter.

Village Pondwatch

April 2026



A mallard duck drops out of a blue sky, making an almost silent vertical landing among the reeds before she swims out to open water. She calls loudly – half a dozen quacks – and begins to dabble in the weeds to feed. Under a grey sky a Mallard drake stands on water lily roots in the middle of the pond. The male bird visits more often in dull weather. His feeding stirs up silt as he forages underwater.

Erratic winds cause constant changes on the pond surface. Long undulating swells roll across and fade into the reeds. Patches of tightly wrinkled ripples shiver and die away, replaced by a succession of whorls and circles. When the wind drops the water becomes still, bright and glassy, reflecting the trees, surrounding plants and the sky above. Another wind makes several horseshoe-shaped bows advance steadily to

the bank, where they rebound and weakly recede.

Tadpoles arrived on Easter Sunday. Hundreds crowd in the sunshine and graze along the shoreline. On wetter days, small dark rafts of tadpoles gather to chew at patches of duckweed and decaying vegetation. In open water, newts racing to the surface make quick forays and, just as quickly, dive back to the unseen depths.

Furry buds on the willow bush have burst open to tip the twigs with delicate puffs of lemon-yellow pollen sprays.

They exactly match the breast feathers of blue

tits that hop along the branches. A small flock of goldfinches also passes by and one bird comes down to drink at the edge of the pond. Clumps of marsh marigold produce masses of large yellow flowers while old bulrush heads are stripped bare on the sodden stems. New banded reeds are marching across the pond.

ROAD SAFETY!!

An urgent note to all residents and visitors: On foot on the roads - take care to be seen!

There are few footpaths beside our local roads, so anyone walking must be wary of other traffic. Cyclists are also at risk, especially on a main commuter route with some 50,000 vehicles travelling both ways through the village each week.

Twilight or grey, drizzly days make for poor visibility on our country roads. Bright sunshine behind the hedges and trees also creates pools of deep shadow along the roadside.

Our Community Speedwatch teams have measured more vehicles going

through the village with lower average speeds. However, **drivers report near misses when cyclists or pedestrians wearing dark clothing are seen only just in time to avoid a collision.**

We urge anyone using the road on foot or on a bike to be prepared. Take care to wear hi-visibility or light coloured clothing at all times and help reduce the risk of a potentially serious Road Traffic Incident (RTI).

Community Garden

The last month has been all about growing! Hundreds of seeds have been sown and we ran out of space in the greenhouse for all the little seedlings. Never ones to ignore a challenge, our team have put their heads together to convert the large cold frame to accommodate these early plants more easily. It was only used for larger pots as the top access made it difficult to set the delicate trays down inside, but our 'elves' have made some bespoke staging to raise the table area giving us a much more useful 'growing on' space without falling headfirst into the cold frame. As ever, this work was done using mostly recycled materials falling in line with our reduce, recycle, reuse policy; many of the seeds sown also reflect this as they were saved from last season.



We have been busy potting up cuttings as well as newly grown plants in readiness for our plant sale this month. With the weather finally starting to warm up it is rewarding to

see everything leafing out and the fruit trees and bushes are looking fantastic with their showy spring blossom, and the wallflowers have put on a great display to compete with the later spring bulbs. Our efforts in planting bulbs in the wildflower area has meant a succession of colour with more to come before the trees have barely woken up. Inevitably the bunnies are also very active at the moment, if you are visiting the garden please remember to shut the gates as you pass through – it is our only defence against them eating all the fresh growth in the flower garden and vegetable patch. The slugs of course are everywhere!

A lot of the work being done now is in preparation for our Coffee (and Tea) Morning on the 16th and it will be lovely to see you all – the garden is looking good. Hopefully the seedlings will be just ready for planting out and we are restocking the plant stand with a variety of perennials to fill those gaps in your borders. Cake will be available to go with your drink and our fingers are crossed for a sunny day to sit and chat as well as look around.

A group of us are off to visit the Dutch bulb fields and gardens so we'll be brimming with inspiration by the time you read this.

Remember, the garden is open to all (no dogs please as we grow food items). You are welcome at any time, our working sessions are on Wednesday and Saturday mornings between 10 – 1pm. Drop by and say hello.
